Prefects Ensure Cash Flows in for Water Aid

This November our outstanding prefect team showed that team work is the best way to achieve their goals. The Senior Prefects, led by Events Co-Ordinator, Jessica Martin, decided to raise money for Water Aid, a leading international charity which campaigns to improve sanitation and provide clean water and toilets for everyone.

The group decided to raise money by collecting loose change and holding a tuck shop and cake sale, we also wanted to get students participating actively in the fundraising. So we organised a volleyball tournament too, under the slogan *'Can you Beat the Elite?'* This led to a fun packed day of activities for all students. Jessica Martin, who is also a Senior Prefect, co-ordinated all of the day's events and said,

"The day went really well. The students really enjoyed the tuck shop and cake sale – we were sold out in less than 20 minutes!"

In addition to the Water Aid fundraising, the Prefects also co-ordinated the collection of food donations brought into school by all students in 'payment' for wearing non-uniform. Clio Long, Deputy Head Girl, commented, "I was surprised at how much food we got. It was nice to see everyone working as a team. We came together really well as a team and used our initiative. This particular project really brought out our team working skills and helped us to bond as a group."

Jedd Watson, who is a Team Leader and Senior Prefect, worked on organising the Food Bank collections. "It was nice to see everyone volunteering to help." Meanwhile, Head Girl, Mia Singleton, who led a team of Prefects on the collection during the morning, said, "I think it went really well. The room was absolutely bursting with tins and pasta."

Ms Metcalfe, Prefect Co-Ordinator, said, "It was so brilliant to see the Prefects taking on the responsibility for organising the event. I think they did a super job and certainly learnt a lot about events management and improved their organisational skills. I am always pleased with their commitment to St Helena School and this event made me exceptionally proud of them."

Pretty Curious

Recently, 43 Year 8 and 9 girls attended a hands on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Maths) event, just for girls!

Sponsored by EDF Energy, Pretty Curious is an exciting experience, designed to encourage girls and young women into what has stereotypically been seen as a male-dominated field.

The venue itself was a huge inflatable igloo in the middle of Trinity Park, Ipswich. During the day, girls were involved in a range of activities which included: finding out about smart technology, building nuclear reactors using the latest virtual reality headsets and creating their own smart gadgets using littleBits (electronics equipment) and some crazy craft materials.

Working in teams, the girls demonstrated excellent teamwork, ingenuity and resilience. One team were top of the leaderboard for the VR challenge, earning a small prize for building their nuclear reactor in the fastest time. Great fun was had by all, and the girls made Miss Grainger, Mrs Shah and myself very proud. They were enthusiastic, fabulous scientists and a credit to St Helena School.





In the summer term, students took part in Readathon. The aim was to encourage reading for pleasure, whilst raising money for good causes.

Last week, the school received a certificate and letter of thanks from the organisers of Readathon, acknowledging receipt of £500 raised by our students.

Extra bonus points can be gained at the end of the match if the robot can climb up posts and hang, this is quite an engineering challenge.

The careers offer is changing!

In line with the school motto 'Aspire, believe achieve' we want to give students the freedom to aspire to the futures they want, by providing them with the information and opportunities they need, enabling them to realise and achieve their aspirations.

Over the past 2 terms there has been lots of changes in the way Careers education, information, advice and guidance is offered at St Helena School. Some of you may already be aware that we've made the decision not to offer work experience in the same way we used to. It has become increasingly difficult to secure enough good quality placements within easy travelling distance for students. So it has been decided to do things differently this year. We're excited to tell you about some of the changes we've made so far and our vision for future terms!

We now have 2 members of staff dedicated to offering careers information, advice and guidance to students. They will also work with teaching staff across the faculties and with the Head of PSME to promote careers education and work related learning opportunities so they can be offered to students in their lessons. Miss McGuinness joins the team as our new Careers Coordinator, with a focus of re-vamping the careers offering at school to ensure it is aligned with the students' needs and wishes.

Since joining the school, Miss McGuinness has conducted a 'Student Voice' activity – including a survey completed by each form to gather ideas about the careers services and information students would like to see at school. Miss McGuinness works Tuesday-Thursday and can be found in the LRC Office.

Laura Eaves joins us as our Directions Careers Adviser to provide impartial careers guidance to students. To ensure our students get valuable support and tailored guidance to help them choose the best next step. Appointments are available to students on Fridays on request (through Miss McGuinness) Year 11 students are given priority during the autumn term.

Careers drop in sessions –Thursday lunchtimes, where topics relating to employability skills (e.g. CV and personal statement writing and interviewing skills) are covered. In addition, visitors from various industries (as requested by students) are giving up their time to speak with students to share their work, education and training experiences. Miss McGuinness


