Wishing you all a great summer break and thank you for your support.





Heritage Lottery Project

During the autumn of 2015 the school was successful in securing a £50,000 Heritage Lottery Grant through its Young Roots programme, to redesign our courtyard area between the main school buildings. This is an opportunity for the school to reveal the Roman heritage that is buried beneath the ground.

It is believed that St Helena School is unique in that it is situated above rich Roman commercial and trading activity in the Sheepen area. Later, the use of this area was

changed following the Boudican revolt in AD 61 and it became a sanctuary, incorporating a number of temples. St Helena School has the remains of two out of the four Roman Temples that have been discovered in the Sheepen area. Near one of the temples



on the school site, a plaque was discovered, dedicating the temple to the God of Jupiter. More recently, following the construction of the new Science and Food Technology building, the remains of Roman precinct walls have been discovered together with many other smaller artefacts.

Being the custodians of important historical remains lead us to applying for the Heritage Lottery "Young Roots" Grant in order that we can celebrate and share this history with the wider community.

The Young Roots programme requires the project to involve young people, and along with St Helena School students, we have students from Essex University and Colchester Institute who are also participating in the project.

Following the students research, they have created a design for the courtyard which includes for a small amphitheatre as an outdoor seating and performance area. Cobbled pavers mark the foundations of the temple below. Work on the courtyard will commence during the school summer holidays. Other aspects of the project the team have worked on include a song, a children's book, mosaic and films diaries of the students' experience – these will all form part of the legacy of the project for everyone to enjoy.

The girls were nervous but performed confidently and accurately under pressure. We are very proud of how they represented St Helena School. Well done!

Honey Gowing said 'I think this has benefited my French by allowing me to know the French spelling bee vocabulary and spell in French out loud when timed under pressure. It has also improved my knowledge of French accents. I was glad I took part in it and represented the school and I would definitely take part in other activities like it.'

Bobbie Chappell-Wood: 'I was very nervous but I was one of the last people so I gained courage. I was surprised at how fast some of the other students could spell. It was faster than I could imagine — I couldn't even understand! I was shocked that the judges could still understand them. When it was my turn, I was shaking with nerves and my voice was a bit croaky, which was embarrassing. Also, I passed three words that I knew!'

Maria Ivanova: 'Taking part in the spelling bee was really interesting, despite there being some really tough opponents! I really enjoyed it.'

Charlie Coombes: 'I really enjoyed the French spelling bee because as well as learning how to spell French words, it also helped me with my French pronunciation and even my spelling out loud in English.'

Athletics Success





At the recent Colchester Schools partnership athletics event the following students set new school athletics records - all in the Yearr 10/11 age group

Scott Cannon 100 meters 11.6 seconds Callum McKay 200 metres 23.2 seconds Rebecca Jeggo 200 metres 25.2 seconds David Igbinoba Shot Put 12.71 metres Discus 29.45 metres Scott Cannon, Callum McKay, Jack Hughes and Jack Shepherd 4 x100 Relay 46.7 seconds



Rebecca & Callum both had very successful Essex Championships recently.

Callum won bronze medals in the 100 & 200m, as a first year U17 athlete, breaking the Harriers' club nine year old 100m record.

Rebecca won silver medals in both the 100m & 200m, again breaking her club record in the 100m, recording the 5th best time in the UK to date.

Her 200m was 24.95 seconds, which would have also achieved national schools standard. (25.20), but for a +2.8 wind.

London Marathon

Until recently, I had never run more than 5k in the annual Race for Life. I started doing the weekly parkrun in Castle Park (which is awesome and free!) and then two years ago I started running longer distances and completed the Colchester half marathon in 2014. While watching the London Marathon ast April I decided I would do it this year, whatever it took.

I secured a charity place with Shelter, who are a charity who help people with vulnerable housing situations. I chose to support Shelter because one of the most basic human needs is somewhere safe to live and unfortunately, for a variety of

reasons, not everyone has that security. Some people and their families face eviction at short notice with nowhere to move to, some people sleep on friends' sofas, some people lose their homes when they can't keep up with mortgage or rent payments and some end up sleeping rough.

I had to raise a minimum sponsorship of £2000. I was worried that raising the money would be the most difficult aspect but actually I soon beat the target through generous friends and family and a few events. It was a relief to be able to focus on the training instead of worrying about how to raise the money.

I trained with my fabulous running group, Run Eat Sleep, building up to 20 miles in training. We didn't run further than that as you're supposed to leave the last 6.2 miles until the day.

The big day finally came and it was an amazing experience from start to finish. On the way to the start the London underground was full of nervous-looking people in running clothes or fancy dress, some of whom were novice marathon runners like me and some who were much more experienced. We saw people dressed as Paddington, Adam and Eve, firefighters, rhinos, a Cool Runnings team, a huge triceratops, a man carrying a washing machine on his back and so many more.

I loved every second of the day and grinned throughout the whole 26.2 miles with my two training buddies. We didn't hit the 'The Wall' and the crowds were amazing. Imagine thousands of people calling your name and encouraging you the whole way! We completed it in 4 hours 49 minutes and 44 seconds. My target was really just to finish but I hoped to do it in under 5 hours, so I was delighted with the result. I was very reluctant to take my medal off for at least a week!

I was even more delighted by the fundraising. The total is still to be finalised as I need to add in the money collected by our lovely prefects (organised by Ms Metcalfe) but it will be just over £4000 which is double the amount I had to raise. We look forward to welcoming Year 5 on Friday 17th June.







The Maths Department



Horticultural Society's (RHS) Rocket Science Experiment as part of STEM club. The RHS Rocket Science project is working in partnership with the UK Space Agency. This project is a UK wide experiment and we are delighted to be part of such a unique project. It is a fun, interactive way to get students thinking about how plants might grow in space and factors affecting growth. It will also help them understand the challenges of life in space.

An application for the seeds was submitted back in December 2015. Earlier In September, 2kg of rocket seeds were transported to the International Space Station on Soyuz 44S. The seeds were kept in microgravity for 6 months by Tim Peake who cared for them on the ISS for his Principia mission starting in December.



The seeds have now landed on Earth and St Helena School will be one of 10,000 very lucky schools to receive 100 seeds from space. These will be grown and compared to seeds that have not been to space to see if there are any differences in growth. No one at St Helena School will know which seeds have been to

Earth. The 200 seeds will be marked up in packs of RED or BLUE and nothing more, their origin will remain a heavily guarded secret.

Students will be given a briefing session on how to plant and care for the seedlings prior to the planting date so that experimental procedures are followed.

Due to the nature of the experiment measurements will be taken on fixed days over a

six week period. The data is then entered into a database and submitted for analysis by scientists from the RHS and European Space Agency. Results and conclusions will be published on the RHS Campaign for School Gardening website.

It will be an exciting way for our young scientists to contribute to a National experiment and share their learning with the whole school community. The seeds were planted on Tuesday 19th April and we hope to update readers further in a future edition of Reflections.

Making Music was Magic

During last term, Year 10 Media students have been studying the Promotion of Music. This assignment requires students to explore how a band or artiste has been promoted across the media. It's a modern way of looking at the music industry; since the advent of the internet, many acts are now making use of the web to tell the world about their new songs and tour plans. Students then get the opportunity to create their own band or artiste which they promote by making web pages, posters, magazine features, scripts and storyboards. Ms Metcalfe, Subject Leader for Media Studies, said: "This is probably my favourite assignment as it enables students to gain skills that they would use if they go on to work in the industry. Music promotion is a really inspiring topic and completely relevant to our students."

Callum McKay, told Reflections about the work he did on this topic. "I studied Justin Bieber because he used to be a bit troubled and now he's come back from that and is even more famous than before. This shows his resilience! I used Bieber's success for my own campaign for the artist Kingsley Parker. I was really proud of my work. I'm really looking forward to working on the film project now. I'd consider working as a sports journalist at the end of my athletics careers."

Fay Harrison added, "During our project for 'Promotion of Music', we were given full responsibility for the outcome of our assignment. We had to use our own time in order to take photos for the poster, giving us the freedom to use our ideas creatively and effectively. The best part of the project was being given the chance to experiment with Photoshop and find the best way to promote our products."

Following the award of Star Student, Eloise Parratt, said, "When creating our own poster for the promotion of music, we were able to have independence by taking images ourselves outside of school, and using the software of Photoshop to create our final piece."

William Crawford continued, "I used my friend Bradley as a model for my poster. I decided to create an urban rap artiste because that's what my target audience is into and I thought the outfit he was wearing suited this genre. I did enjoy the project and learnt a lot about the language used in the promotion of music. I found out about record labels, for example how they work. I would quite like to work in the music industry, though perhaps as a graphic designer creating promotional material like CD covers."

Another successful project was created by Grace McBurney. She said, "In this media assessment, I created a band called Cipher. They are an indie band, so I was inspired by similar artists such as Panic! At the Disco and Bastille. I enjoyed this project, as it has helped me to learn a lot more about the promotion of music, and has also improved media skills, as I had to work independently and create the poster on Photoshop."

Finally, Holly Jackson commented, "In this project, I designed an Indie band called Intermission. I researched existing Indie artists and took inspiration from their style. I took photos similar to those belonging to Indie bands and used Photoshop to edit them. I enjoyed this project as it enabled me to be creative and learn more about the music industry."
