Learning in the Year 1 Classes

Last week the Year 1 children were discussing the features of non-fiction texts. To support their learning the children created a fact file about an animal. At the start of the

week in groups the children studied an example of a fact file about a fox. After reading the file the children highlighted key features that needed to be included in their file. Once they had a good understanding they set about creating their



own files. The children were very enthused with this task and have produced some fantastic and very informative files.

The focus of Mathematics last week was shape and

measures. The children started the week recapping their understanding of 3D shape features using a wide range of concrete resources to create named shapes. To finish the week the focus was time. This can be a tricky concept for the children and one that would benefit them from having the opportuni ty to practice regularly at home.
