# Did you know that St. John's Green school is part of the Essex Children's University and that all children aged 5 and over can sign up for just £4.50.

Your child will receive a passport that they can have stamped for doing various fun learning activities outside of school hours. Once they gain 30 hours they will be invited to attend a Graduation Ceremony at Essex University, complete with gown and mortarboard and a full day of fun. Last time this included a Mad Science session, story telling, drama and much more. #### Why I signed up my kids to the Children's University.
