

Willard Price

When I was 8 or 9 there was nothing that could stand in the way of me reading a Willard Price Adventure book. Willard Price had grown up in the early 20th century and become a roving reporter for National Geographic Maga-

zine, travelling round the world three times. It wasn't till the age of 62 that he wrote his first adventure book 'Amazon Adventure' in 1949 and over a series of 14 books he gripped generations of children with his tales of Hal and Roger and their exciting encounters with ferocious animals all over the world. He said himself:

My aim in writing the Adventure series for young people was to lead them to read by making reading exciting and full of adventure. At the same time I wanted to inspire an interest in wild animals and their behaviour. Judging from the letters I have received from boys and girls around the world, I believe I have helped open to them the worlds of books and natural history

Well he certainly did for me and I would recommend his books to anyone who likes exciting adventure stories.
