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Beat the Street

Beat the Street fever does seem to be slowly taking over the school and I have had several conversations with parents and children about the elements they have already braved to secure an additional beep!

Beat the Street is a fun, free game for the community of Colchester to see how far you can walk, cycle and run around your local area. So far nearly 400 pupils, parents and staff have started tapping the Beat Boxes with their fobs and cards - Team SJG are top of the leaderboard at the moment!

The school with the most points at the end of the 7 weeks wins £400 of sport and fitness equipment. There are some important things to remember - cards (which must be registered online to count) are for adults, fobs (which are already registered to the school) are for the children. The game is designed to improve physical activity; those who drive between Beat Boxes will be disqualified and it is not good publicity for their school or organisation. Fobs registered online are put into a weekly draw for 'spot prizes'.

Who are We?

We've had lots of questions recently about the classes in the school and why they are so named. Fortunately our resident historian, Mr Eves is on the case and has produced an overview that explains all:

Chariot

Colchester has the only known chariot (track) circus in the North West of Europe. The track encompassed Abbey Fields and the Cavalry Barracks.

Jumbo

This class is named after the large water tower that has the nickname Jumbo and dominates the Colchester skyline.

Star

This class is named after the nursery rhyme Twinkle Twinkle Little Star written by Jane Taylor from Colchester.

Roses

North Essex and Colchester were major rose growing areas. This started with the Cant family in 1765.

Circus

Colchester has the only known chariot (track) circus in the North West of Europe. The Circus encompassed Abbey Fields and the Cavalry Barracks.

Eagles

A common symbol of Roman imperial rule. (Eddie the Eagle is Colchester United's mascot.)

Mercury

This class is named after the Mercury Theatre.

Claudius

First Roman Emperor of Briton; rode through Colchester (Camolodunum) on an elephant!

Romans

Colchester (Camolodunum) was the capital of Romano-Briton, the Romans.

Iceni

Boudicca's tribe, who attacked the Roman town Camolodunum (Colchester) in c61AD and burnt it to the ground.

Dutch

In the 1600's the population of East Anglia was doubled by Flemish religious refugees. In Colchester they brought their weaving skills with them and settled in the area west of the castle. This area became known as the Dutch Quarter.

Paxman

Named after the famous steam and diesel engine makers of Colchester.

Castle

Named after the castle in Colchester, built by the Normans from the ruins of Claudius' temple.

Cavalier

Named after the Royalists who occupied Colchester in the Civil War.

Magnets

William Gilbert, from Colchester, was the first person to write a book on magnets, De Magnete. He is credited with coining the word electricity.

Oysters

Named after the best oysters in the world from Mersea Island. One of the reasons the Romans came here, apart from the lead and silver.

Trinovantes

The wealthy tribe that ruled North Essex before the Roman invasion in 41 AD.

Southway Murals Project

Our Year 5&6 children have all spent a day this week working with a local artist on the Southway Murals Project, which is a project to regenerate the murals in the underpasses on the Southway. All of the children made some quite fantastic cardboard murals as part of their work which will be on display in the Arts Centre over Half Term. Many thanks to Miss Kerr who organised and arranged it for the children.
