Abbotts Hall Farm

On perhaps the rainiest day of July so far, yesterday, our Year 2 children had elected to go to Abbotts Hall Farm which was subsidised by our PTA. Whilst there, the children went on a walk around the farm and looked at the different crops that were being grown.

They were taught how to tell the difference between barley and wheat, (in layman's terms—barley has a long beard, while wheat has a shorter one and when ready for harvesting wheat is golden brown and barley is yellow white).


