

Book Review by Mr. Eves Midnight Over Sanctaphrax

Today it is common, in the media, to have debates about the perceived problem with boys' reading. This moral panic normally divides itself into two schools. Those who have never read a children's book since attending school and promote reading lists of stodgy classics that came out decades ago; and those that go

the other way and promote dumbed down graphic novels. There nothing wrong with a lot of the classics and some graphic novels are great but there is no need to go down either of these routes, if you have a boy. There are plenty of good books out there to capture his imagination. One such series is Paul Stewart and Chris Riddell's Edge Chronicles. Two fathers, whose sons went to the same primary school and they decided to write books for boys. They are beautifully written by Stewart and excellently illustrated by Riddell.
