How Do I Make Good Decisions

Making good decisions is an integral part of life as the deci-sions we make affect us and our families. For children this can be even harder and it's why one of our core jobs as parents is to support our children in making good decisions and also living with the potential consequences of the decisions they make.

One of the biggest challenges we constantly face in school is not so much things that happen in school, but things that happen outside of school, most specifically with children via xbox's/playstations and via their phones. My advice is very simple and is the same advice I apply to my own children (to put it into context my son is 14):

- 1, His phone stays downstairs, he only uses it downstairs and we check it every day, this includes suffering watching the youtube videos he watches..
- 2, His Xbox is downstairs, he only plays on it downstairs and he is only allowed on it for an hour.

This does mean, that we can't access the TV, but actually as the parent and having made that decision to have children, I make the sacrifices to keep my children safe.

We have agreed rules in the house and if they are broken he loses one, the other or both. Most importantly, if someone sends or posts something that is inappropriate, he is told to automatically block that number.

Please don't get me wrong, I love my son very much, but I do not trust him when it comes to electronics because actually the real risk to my son is not on his cycle to school, or playing rugby or someone in a white van. The real risk is unfettered access to the internet. Whether he likes it or not, I'm the parent and as such, he will follow the rules we set down or not have his electronics.

I fully appreciate the trauma of having your children at home over Easter and their devices do make it easier for you to have some peace and quiet. But I would urge all parents to put in place the two rules above—I guarantee that your children, long term, will be much happier for it!

Sent on behalf of the NHS - Vaccinations for 5 to 11 year olds

From next week, parents and carers of all 5 to 11 year olds will be able to book a COVID-19 vaccination for their child. The national booking service will open for this age group on Saturday 2 April 2022, with the first appointments available from Monday 4 April 2022 onwards.

Appointments will be available in larger vaccina-tion centres and some community pharmacies. Larger vaccination centres will also offer whole family appointments so that already eligible adults and older children who are not fully vaccinated can take advantage of the 'evergreen' offer and have a vaccination at the same time as their 5 to 11 year old.

Appointments for 5 to 11 year olds who are not at risk' will also be available at some GP-run sites. If your GP is offering the vaccine, they will contact you. Please do not contact them.

Vaccinations are already available for 'at risk' 5 to 11 year olds, and children in this age group who live with someone who has a weakened immune system. Until now vaccinations for this 'at risk' group of children have been available through GPs and special educational needs schools but parents and carers will be now able to book their vaccination through the national booking service when that opens for 5-11s.

Report to parents from the full governing body meeting from March 2022. (Lee Brooker, Parent Governor)

Governors were tasked in recent weeks to work with the year group lead teachers to prepare a report based on the children's attainment data supplied from the school. This included asking challenging questions to the teachers about how the children are being supported and developed.

Governors have all recently completed a skills audit form which has been fantastic to highlight training areas which governors would like to utilise to always build skills to benefit the children and school

We spoke in depth about how the Senior leaders and teachers are managing Covid related absences from staff and students. This is still very much creating chal-lenges to make sure that all classes can maintain consistency for the children. Governors thank the school staff and teachers, who have done a fantastic job at being flexible to change at short notice, covering classes and managing the constant changes, which just cannot be avoided or foreseen.

For all the negative impacts lockdowns and absences have caused, there has been a fantastic show of community spirit and people really coming together as a community.
