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STEMClub

The STEM club at St Helena School, run by the Science department, is a specially designed after school club available to all years, which provides students with an opportunity to gain practical, teamwork and leadership skills whilst improving their confidence in the STEM subjects – Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics.

The STEM club has been relaunched this year with a brand-new programme of exciting activities - with over 80 students signing up, STEM club has already been a massive success. The term kicked off with rocketry, where students built and designed their own rockets. On Wednesday 1st November, students were taken over to Hilly Fields where they launched their rockets, 32 in total! There was a fantastic atmosphere, and all students were able to celebrate their success.

More recently, students have been hard at work building catapults from junk! Students had to work to a budget and use their knowledge to determine the best design for their catapult. Each design was tested for accuracy, power and destructive capabilities – chocolate prizes were awarded to winners in each category! A special prize went to Caitlin Fraser in Year 7 for designing two catapults for under 100 STEM pounds!

The students have been fantastic this term and I look forward to working with them on future projects.

The World War 1 trip was a great experience for all the History students who attended. Our guide was an ex-serviceman so we were able to learn many interesting stories about the First World War.

The trenches were first. They are located in Belgium and called the Bayernwald Trenches. Although they were not the original trenches, they were a close replica of them. These were the German trenches so they were made slightly differently to ours and less muddy.

We visited many memorials during our trip. There are 50,000 German graves at Langermarde and 12,000 British graves at Tyne Cot. There is also a memorial containing 10,000 graves, which is the biggest on the Somme. One of the best memorials we visited was the Thiepval monument. It was built by the British and is the biggest war memorial in the world. It holds 400 graves of unknown men. In the evening, there was a ceremony at the Menin Gate. The walls were covered with the names of those who fought and died in the area.

We also walked to Sunken Lane where the famous photo of the First Lancashire Fusiliers was taken before they went over the top on July 1st 1916 during the battle of the Somme.

Another outstanding place we visited was Hill 60. There is a bunker with poppies and flowers decorating it to mark the battle that happened there.

Overall, the World War 1 trip was a great way to understand more about what happened during World War 1.


What did you like about your winning photograph?

Return to St Helena School



St Helena School 1961 to 1968 In July 2018 it will be fifty years since I left St Helena School.

I will be returning, with two more ex-pupils in May to meet Miss King, and tour the school. Fifty years seems an appropriate time to reflect, revisit, indulge in nostalgia and see how the school has changed.

I was in the first intake after the desegregation of boys and girls. I remember the older pupils being almost afraid of straying into the girls' side of the field and probably feeling very daring when they did.

There were air-raid shelters in the school grounds left over from times of war but only used as storage. I remember, when I was about twelve, being part of a working party whose job it was to remove what seemed like hundreds of chairs from the shelters. Later they were demolished.


When Mr Boyle arrived as Headteacher, he surprised everyone by wearing a gown, introducing Latin and starting a sixth form. I had been a Prefect since my second year and as I went into sixth form I was made Head Boy. I can honestly say that my secondary schooling shaped my love for various disciplines of learning. I wish I could tell Mrs Vickers, Deputy Headmistress, who taught A level history how much more I now know.

When I look at the current website for the school I realise much has changed since my day but I hope that current pupils will take away many happy memories and be positively shaped by their experience as I was.
