Those parents who were able to pop along for Open Morning this week will, I hope, have noticed that our 'Learning Disposition' posters have now been put up across both sites by Mr Bromley and Mr Skinner and are replacing our Core Values.

Our weekly awards are now embedding these principles of learning with children being given the award for demonstrating one of our Learning Dispositions.








You should also be hearing your children talking to you about SOLO Taxonomy. Solo stands for "structure of the observed learning outcome". It is an approach designed by educational psychologists John Biggs and Kevin Collis to scatfold higher-order thinking for pupils.

It's all about increasing the levels of complexity in tasks as pupils move through their learning. Think of it as a kind of do-it-yourself differentiation for children which is supported by the class teachers.

Solo is a very visual concept. The symbols are a simple tool for pupils to confidently tell you where they are in their learning.

The taxonomy helps them to appreciate that there are different stages in the learning process and that understanding something new does not come about instantly.



SOLO Taxonomy is designed to make children aware of the difference between surface and deep learning, about how they are constructing their own learning and what they need to do to achieve more.

It's about helping them to think independently about their learning, what they have understood and the next steps they need to make.

School Funding Crises

You will no doubt have both seen and heard in the news about the funding crises that are affecting all schools in England. There have been several articles in the local papers recently and there was a march by head teachers on Downing Street on Friday 28th September.

St John's Green is no exception to the implications of the funding crises and have taken a long term approach over the last few years with the main implication being a steady reduction in class based Learning Support Staff, particularly in our KS2 classes.

In July 2018 the independent Institute for Fiscal Studies confirmed that since 2010 our budgets have been slashed by 8% in real terms. In August 2018 the independent Education Policy Institute stated that schools in many parts of England face a severe "shortage of teachers".

In real terms this has equated to a funding reduction of over £150,000 for our school over the last few years.

If there is not a significant shift in government policy over the next year then despite the cutbacks that we have already made as a school, St John's Green could also be in the same situation as other local schools in having to make very difficult decisions about staff and resources.

Dear Parent/Carer.

Sexual and criminal exploitation of children - will you spot the signs?

The exploitation of children is, sadly, a growing problem and has a devastating impact on those directly affected and their families. It happens, and it happens here, in Essex. This is not just involving older children, even primary age children are being drawn into exploitation. It is never too soon for our children to learn how to keep themselves safe.

Essex Police is working hard to tackle these awful crimes but we cannot do it alone. As a parent or carer with responsibility for a child I am asking for your help. Please be aware of the warning signs together with the help and advice available to you.

Exploitation - what is it?

Sexual exploitation involves a child being manipulated, forced or deceived into sexual activity often for financial gain or to build status or control.

Criminal exploitation involves a child being coerced to commit criminal activity. This is often associated with gangs and the selling of illegal drugs.

The warning signs

- Is your child regularly going missing, coming home late or persistently absent from school?
- · Do they have new or older friends different to their normal social group?
- Do they have money, expensive-looking clothes or a new phone you didn't buy for them?
- Are they being secretive when using their phone or the internet or perhaps making / receiving lots of calls and texts?
- · Has their mood changed or have they become withdrawn or aggressive?
- Are they harming themselves or displaying inappropriate sexualised behaviour?

These are indicators. They do not always mean a child is being exploited, but, please see them as a potential 'warning sign'.

If you are worried, please call us. You will not be wasting our time. A team of Essex Police officers and staff are on standby to listen, help and offer advice. The line is open Monday to Friday 08:00-16:00 with a voicemail facility outside of these hours.

As a parent of school age children myself I would encourage you to talk to your child / children about these potential dangers. Thank you for taking the time to read this letter.
