Purple Pinkie—End Polio Now

Parents will be very aware that the school has supported the 'End Polio Now' campaign for a number of years, in support of the organisations that are attempting to eradicate polio worldwide. In conjunction with the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, every £1 that is donated is tripled to £3. Our donations from today of £445 will therefore be tripled to £1335 by the Foundation. Twenty five years ago there were 350,000 new cases of polio; in 2017, there were 22 cases - a little bit of history in the making.

Nirvana Day



Nirvana Day is an annual Buddhist festival that remembers the death of the Buddha when he reached Nirvana at the age of 80. It is also known as Parinirvana Day. It is celebrated by some Buddhists on February 8th and by others on February 15th. Nirvana is believed to be the end of the cycle of death and rebirth. Buddhism teaches that Nirvana is reached when all want and suffering is gone. Reflecting On Nirvana Day, Buddhists think about their lives and how they can work towards gaining the perfect peace of Nirvana. They remember friends or relations who have recently died and reflect on the fact that death is a part of life for everyone. The idea that nothing stays the same is central to Buddhism. Buddhists believe that loss and change are things to be accepted rather than causes of sadness.


Valentines Day

St. Valentine's Day falls on February 14th of each year. Although the name is Saint Valentine's Day, most people refer to the day as Valentine's Day, or even the Feast of Saint Valentine. It was originally a day to celebrate Saint Valentinus, who performed weddings for soldiers who were not allowed to marry. He was imprisoned for this, as well as for ministering to Christians. Saint Valentinus wrote a letter to the daughter of his jailer before he was executed. His letter was signed 'From your Valentine'. He was buried on February 14th. Valentine's Day was not associated with romantic love until the Middle Ages. By the 1700s, in England it began to resemble the Valentine's Day we know today. -On average, men spend double the amount of money on Valentine's Day gifts than women spend. -Cupid is the son of Venus. Venus was the god of beauty and love. -In Victorian times it was considered bad luck to sign a Valentine's Day card. -Many believe the X symbol became synonymous with the kiss in medieval times. People who couldn't write their names signed in front of a witness with an X. The X was then kissed to show their sincerity.
