Asymptomatic Testing of School Staff in School

From this week, staff in school (as opposed to those working from home remotely) will have the option of testing themselves using Lateral Flow Tests, to ascertain whether they may or may not be asymptomatic for Coronavirus.

These tests are carried out by staff twice weekly.

Should a member of staff test positive following a Lateral Flow Test, they must Self Isolate immediately and follow this up with a PCR test. (As an aside PCR stands for Polymerase Chain Reaction). If the PCR test confirms positive, then we will have to isolate the bubble and the school staff associated with that bubble.

I'm obviously hopeful, that as the Coronavirus case infections are falling, then positive cases are less likely to happen. At the end of the day, the most overwhelming key to a child's success is the positive involvement of parents.

FGB Meeting -Report (25/1/2021) Patrick Shields

At the most recent Governing Board meeting, much of the focus was on the how well the school has been coping given the wideranging and ongoing challenges presented by Covid. The governors are extremely encouraged by the provision of a full school curriculum, across the in-school and home-learning settings. The commitment and efforts by the teaching staff, the excellent levels of pupil engagement and the hard work all parents have been putting in to support the children are clearly paying dividends. The board believes strongly that this is a collective effort of which the entire school community should be proud.

Indeed, the academic progress made was evident from the assessment period data, which is regularly reviewed by the governors. The disruption to normal school life caused from the outset of the pandemic in early 2020, has required focusing on a 'catchup curriculum' in order ensure that all year groups are given the best possible opportunity to maintain their learning at age related expectations, in spite of everything that Covid has thrown in our way. The AP1 data certainly indicates that all year groups are on track.

Despite the very unusual circumstances, much of the usual business of the school rolls on. So the board reviewed school finances, which are solid and well-managed, with particular note made of the significant investment in ensuring the school had the technology and infrastructure in place to provide 'live' lessons for all. In this regard the board acknowledged the great work done by the teaching staff, but importantly also by Marion Simmons and Richard Matthews, who have helped smooth the many ruffles in all things tech related around home-learning.

The board also reviewed the pastoral work done across the school with our more vulnerable families, which has always been a great strength of St Johns Green, as a community school, and which is even more valuable at times like this. The board was also keen to understand that sufficient focus was being provided to support staff well-being and, of course, that is something that the school leadership takes very seriously.

It's not easy at the moment for anyone, but the board feels very strongly that the school is doing it's the absolute best it can, under the circumstances.
