
Colchester United Holiday Activity— Rugby/Football

Book Review by Emma Mitchell (Year 6) — The Milly Molly Mandy Storybook

This delightful collection of tales tells of a young girl called Millicent Margaret Amanda, known affectionately as Milly-Molly-Mandy.



The 21 stories follow Milly-Molly-Mandy's childhood adventures, which she often shares with her friends, Billy, Susan and Jilly, who all live in the village.

In one story, her 'Muvver' and 'Farver' and other relations send her on many confusing errands, which she's rewarded for with a bag of sweets to share with little-friend-Susan.

Another time Milly-Molly-Mandy's teacher comes to stay! Before Teacher arrives, Milly-Molly-Mandy tries to imagine what it will be like to have Teacher sitting with them at supper and sleeping in the spare room. Can you imagine what that would be like?

On other occasions, Milly-Molly-Mandy and her friends go to parties, the seaside and market.

These stories were first published in 1925 and Milly-Molly-Mandy lives in The Nice White Cottage with the Thatched Roof in a tiny rural village, so life was quite different from ours but the children still enjoy similar things to us, like sweets, fairs and days off school.

The pictures in this book make it particularly enjoyable and fun to read and the language is simple. I would recommend it for everyone because even if you can't read it yourself, it is perfectly suited to reading aloud.
