"When teaching and learning are visible,

In essence every part of the day is a teaching and learning opportunity and we are looking to maximise the times when we respond to your children about how well they have done and possible next steps.

Fffective feedback we know can double the speed of the learning that takes place. This is in part because it is immediate and children can respond and act upon it straight away.

We also know that feedback needs to be repetitive because we don't always learn things right away and we need to then practise to embed that learning.

In all aspects of life, feedback is the breakfast of champions. It lets you know how you are going while also telling you how you can improve.

At the end of the day, the most overwhelming key to a child's success is the positive involvement of parents.
